PROGRAM: John Channon presents Alan Anderson, "Rotary's Climate Action Team"

Alan Anderson is a member of the Northfield Rotary Club #2157. After retirement from a career leading Boy Scouts and after taking courses from Harvard University on the science of climate change, Alan became an advocate and educator about climate change and the commitment and actions individuals can take. He explained the role of greenhouse gases and how the steady rise of CO2 has warmed the planet and is disrupting normal weather patterns: a 115 degree day in France, under 30 degree days with strong early blizzards in the west, soggy spring and scorching summers affecting farmers and their crops, rising sea levels putting coastal cities and ports at risk, extreme flooding, increased power of hurricanes, forest fires, and heat waves that are killing people - disruptions that are causing instability in many areas of the world.

He shared information on five studies on climate change, on which 82%-98% of climate scientists agree the problem is CO2, it is us, and it is urgent. Further, of 14,000 scientific papers on climate change, only .4 percent question whether it is real. It is irreversible and serious, and people must act now to reduce atmospheric CO2 in order to protect current and future generations.

Why Rotary should be involved? As the Northfield Rotary's statement on climate change says, "having a safe, stable environment will be necessary for Rotary to continue to make progress in our six focus areas: 1) promoting peace, 2) fighting disease, 3) clean water, sanitation and hygiene, 4) saving mothers and children, 5) supporting education, and 6) growing local economies. Many years ago, an individual Rotary club saw a need and took action to begin the eradication of polio, and a movement began. The same grassroots effort will be necessary to begin to tackle the climate change problem. We also believe that Rotary is well suited to take on this effort because it has the format and structure to be able to work at a local and global level."

There are a number of individual commitments and actions we all can take: create a Rotary Climate Action Team, join Rotary International's Environmental Sustainability Action Group, become educated and spread the word, learn about and support the revenue neutral carbon fee and dividend proposal, work to reduce your own "carbon footprint". In closing, Alan asked "What kind of world will we pass to our grandchildren?"

Climate Change Statement:

Northfield Rotary Club recognizes that climate change is an unprecedented challenge to humankind. The more CO2 in the atmosphere, the hotter our planet will become. Impacts of climate change will affect the world's vulnerable first and hardest, putting Rotary's good work in the world at risk. We know actions must be taken now to prevent further damage. 
