Alan Page, former State Supreme Court Justice

Alan Page grew up in Canton, Ohio, and attended Notre Dame University before embarking on a Hall of Fame NFL career. Page completed law school in 1978 while still playing in the NFL and practiced in the private sector in the 1980's. After his induction in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1988, Alan and his wife started the Page Education Foundation. Then in 1992, Page was appointed to the Minnesota Supreme Court, where he served until his retirement in 2015. In 2018, Page was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

During the presentation, Justice Page reflected on several topics in a question-and-answer style format.

1954 Brown vs. Board of Education: this US Supreme Court decision ruled that law establishing racial segregation in public schools was unconstitutional. While Alan was only 8 years old at the time, he realized that law could have a great impact and that education was a tremendous tool to make one's life better. This decision also gave Alan hope – if segregation ended in school, perhaps it could be ended everywhere.

Alan initially enrolled in law school in the fall of 1968. He mentioned that law school is a new way of teaching, and he realized early on that he felt overwhelmed. He dropped out of law school shortly thereafter, only to find out that most students in law school felt the same way he did. He returned to law school in 1975.

Despite his Supreme Court and NFL Hall of Fame credentials, Alan Page sees himself as a common man. He is doing what he can to make the world better and believes that we all have that power.

Alan and his wife Diane started the nonprofit Page Education Foundation in 1988 to encourage students of color to pursue post-secondary education. The foundation offers scholarships to students, and in return, these scholars serve their communities as tutors or mentors to younger students. The foundation has provided roughly \$16 million in Page Grants to over 7,700 scholars.

Alan Page has 2 metro schools named after him: Justice Page Middle School in Minneapolis, and Justice Alan Page Elementary is under construction in Maplewood.

Justice Page commented on the death of George Floyd. His reaction is that it is an awful thing to have happened, an awful way to die, and for no reason. It didn't have to happen, and it shouldn't have happened. But since it did happen, will it bring about change? Alan isn't sure if it will bring about change or not. He mentioned these changes take time, but he said his fear is that this will become yesterday's news.

Alan Page is currently part of a movement to amend the language of Minnesota's state constitution. The current language uses "adequate educational system", and Page proposes a change that makes quality education a civil right.
