Murray Death, Sundance Family Foundation

Sundance Family Foundation is a non-profit group that strives to support youth development and strengthen family stability by offering grants to get youth job ready. The Sundance Family Foundation was started in 2003 by St. Paul residents Nancy Jacobs and Mark Sandercott.

Murray discussed their Earn and Learn apprenticeship program, which helps companies connect with young adults and provide mentoring with formalized job training. The program identifies companies challenged to find and retain skilled employees, and this workforce often needs new skills to keep up with 21st century jobs. Further, many students who attend a 4 year college don’t graduate within 6 years, some choose degrees that don’t necessarily prepare them for sustainable work, and some students don’t think they have an op-tion aside from a 4 year college. The Earn and Learn program therefore con-nects these companies with these young people for an apprenticeship and career training opportunity.
