Their youngest, Jack, is 21 and studying music composition. Middle son Sawyer is married and works for Southview Design. Oldest son Taylor works at 3M. Tim cut his teeth in education working as a substitute teacher at St. Odilia. Before coming to White Bear in 1999, he worked as a dean of students in Anoka-Hennepin. With White Bear Lake Area Schools (WBLAS), he has served at the high school as assistant principal and then principal before taking on the role of assistant superintendent of finance and operations. Tim’s responsibilities include nutrition services (serve almost a million lunches each year); transportation (drive 1.7 million miles a year); facilities (operate 18 sites); and he helps with secondary discipline. He has been spending a lot of time lately working on developing the district’s facilities master plan. White Bear’s 2018-19 enrollment is 8,578 students. That number is projected to grow by 2,228 over the next decade as agricultural land on the north end is developed. The district is looking at how to accommodate the increase in student numbers and make needed improvements in facilities. The school board is likely to put a bond request before voters in the near future.

Program: 0-5 Literacy - Setting the Stage for K-12 Success
**Patty Hall introduced Don Draayer and Sylvia Sekhon, MD,
who talked about Reach Out and Read.**

Draayer is former Minnetonka School District Superintendent and Sylvia is a pediatrician with Health Partners and a Reach Out and Read practitioner. Sylvia made the case for prenatal health and highlighted brain development. This is the century of the brain. Eighty percent of brain growth happens by age 3 and 90 percent by age 5. This helps highlight the importance of parents as a child’s first teacher along with the importance of early literacy and early childhood education. Epigenetics is how experiences influence gene activity. Good or bad experiences can turn on or off genes and impact development. Alcohol and drugs impact a fetus, adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) affect a child’s health into adulthood, and resilience is a key to overcoming these effects. School doesn’t start in kindergarten, Don said, noting pediatricians are adding a third requirement for parents. First are immunizations, second is good nutrition, and third is brain development along with the importance of reading. Reach Out and Read gives young children a foundation for success by incorporating books into pediatric care and encouraging families to read aloud together. The best time to shape a child’s future is in the first five years, a critical window of rapid brain development that does not occur at any other time. Reach Out and Read medical providers give books to children at well-child visits from infancy until they start school. They also encourage families to read aloud and engage with their infants, toddlers and preschoolers every day. The program is both cost-effective, and evidence-based: research shows the program results in more frequent reading at home, accelerated vocabulary and critical brain stimulation. First implemented in Minnesota in 1997 at three clinics, the program grew to over 33 clinics in 2006, and has more than tripled since that time. Today one in every three Minnesota children from the ages of 6 months through 5 years of age participates in Reach Out and Read. 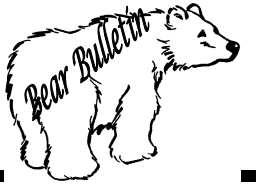
