PROGRAM FROM MEETING OF 5/18/22:

Carter Johnson presents:

Matt McMillan of Press Publications, on the state of newspapers

Matt talked broadly about community newspapers and how they are the same and different from major publications. They all, however, are focused and dependent on "audience." He thinks that community newspapers have a unique loyalty because they are so focused on their individual communities -- local is trusted.

All newspapers leverage that trust to win readers and to win advertisers. Advertisers come aboard when they see that there is committed readership and loyalty. Matt said the perception that newspapers are in decline is false. He pointed to metro papers -- many have been bought out or lost readership, while there are more than 4,000 community papers nationally. There are 275 in Minnesota; the state also has several papers owned by single, public-traded companies like Gannett, meaning those papers are at the whim of public trading and the like. Community papers have shown a resiliency, he said.

He talked about the important civic role of a newspaper -- a watchdog on government, politics and on. When papers close, the community loses that attention and it can jeopardize the community (more gov't spending, fewer voters, fewer candidates, etc.)

Last, a recent Minnesota newspaper market survey showed that papers enjoy healthy readership, even if the perception is different. Eighty-six percent of adults say they read a paper each month.
